ATTENTION DOG OWNERS UNLICENSED DOGS

PRINCE TOWNSHIP BUILDING PERMITS

Permits ensure that construction within the municipality meets with standards set out in the Ontario Building Code. No matter what the specific project may be, the enforcement of codes is carried out to protect public health, safety and welfare. Compliance with municipal by-laws such as the Zoning By-law is also evaluated during the review process.

Building permits are typically required for the following:

- New buildings
- Additions
- Renovations or alterations
- Demolitions
- Prefabricated structures
- HVAC systems (heating, ventilation, air conditioning)
- Miscellaneous for residential (pools, fireplaces, decks, fences, etc.)
- Temporary buildings
- Installing new windows and exterior doors
- Installing new shingles or metal roofing
- Installing new cladding (siding, stucco, etc.)

To be sure, contact the Building Division at 705-759-5398 or email <u>building@cityssm.on.ca</u>, describe the work to be done and investigate what the requirements are.

If your questions cannot be answered over the phone or email, you can show your proposal to the Building Division staff at the Civic Centre - Level 5. They are always ready and willing to help!

Ontario's <u>COVID-19: Enhanced public health</u> and workplace safety measures document reads:

Libraries:

- Circulating materials must be reserved over the telephone or online (OPAC) for contactless curbside delivery or pick-up.
- Patrons must only be permitted to enter the premises to facilitate the contactless drop-off and pick-up or access computers, photocopiers or similar services. (30 minutes maximum in our library)

INTER LIBRARY LOAN: If we don't have a book that you want, call the library and we will order the book for you. There are some restrictions put on by the lending library for example: too new, or they are not loaning out their copy.

USE OPAC: INSTRUCTIONS TO FOLLOW

USE OPAC: Instructions follow.

OPAC is similar to Overdrive in the sense that it is an online database, however, OPAC is directly linked to our library and shows a catalogued inventory of all the items we have in the library, synced through ResourceMate. Patrons can use OPAC to request books

remotely from their home. This can be used to organize curbside pick-up for their library books. Especially useful during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Access and Operation of OPAC:

1. OPAC for our library can be reached by typing in the following web address into the address bar,

https://16052.rmwebopac.com/

- 2. You will be directed to the Prince Township Public Library OPAC home page.
- 3. You must then click the Sign In icon in the upper right-hand corner of the screen.
- 4. You will type in the username provided to you from the library, typically in the format: lastnamefirstname
- 5. Your pin number, also provided by the library, will be the last 4 digits of your 5
- digit barcode. Ex. if your barcode is 12345, your OPAC pin will be 2345.
- 6. When signed in you can search authors, titles, etc. You can add items you want

to check out to your Book Bin.

- 7. To send the request, click the Book Bin icon once you are done browsing.
- 8. You must then do the following steps:
- a. Press the email icon (it looks like an envelope).
- b. In the From section, fill in your email address.
- c. In the To section, fill in the library's email address, ptpl@twp.prince.on.ca d. In the Subject section, type something along the lines of "Book Request"
- e. Specify if you would like to be

contacted by Phone or Email in the notes section.

- f. Press send.
- 9. When the request is received and processed, you will either be contacted by Phone or Email to set up a pick-up time.
- 10. All pick-ups will happen at the Library Book Drop-Off Box.

DROP OFF BOX: If you do return your items. Please put them in a tied plastic bag.

Tips for keeping your property and neighborhood safe

Lock it

Lock your garage, your vehicles and your home - even when you are home. It may sound obvious, but many criminals will check to see if doors are unlocked, giving them an easy opportunity to strike. Also, whether or not you have a security system or a dog, put up signs warning people about both. If everything is locked up and criminals are faced with the prospect of additional deterrents, most will move on.

Secure it

Install additional security locks on exterior doors and windows and don't forget about surveillance! When possible, install devices that permit sight to the other side, such as chain link fences, and keep shrubs and bushes trimmed below ground level windows and trees pruned above eye level to eliminate areas of potential concealment. Consider installing a security system as an additional deterrent.

Light it

Turn on your lights! Use timers on your lights when you're away from your home or business so they appear occupied. At night, use outdoor lighting to enhance illumination in dark areas around your property where an intruder might hide, such as stairwells, alleys and hallways. Install motion lights and/or cameras at all entrances and turn your porch lights on at night.

Hide it

Install and use blinds and curtains to prevent people from seeing inside your home, especially at night. Protect yourself, your belongings and your privacy with good quality window coverings. Consider frosted treatments on garage windows, which will still allow in natural light, but prevent people from seeing inside your garage. And don't "hide" spare keys under a doormat or in a planter; keep them with a trusted neighbor or nearby business.

Remove it

Never leave valuables in your vehicle, especially a wallet or purse. Take any electronics, such as cell phones, tablets and laptops inside with you, including your remote garage door opener. In many cases, criminals will enter a vehicle for the sole purpose of stealing your garage door opener in hopes of gaining access to your garage and, subsequently, your home. Also be cautious about placing boxes from big ticket items, such as a new television, out for recycling as this can be an invitation to thieves who now know exactly what's in your home.

Share it

Introduce yourself to your neighbor's, as neighbor's who know each other watch out for one another. Get to know other people who live on your street. Consider setting up (or joining!) a page on social media for your subdivision as a way to communicate and share information with one another. But keep in mind you need to be cautious about what you share on social media sites even if it's considered a friendly or helpful group. Divulging too much personal information can potentially put you and your property at risk, as there is no way to know or control the intentions of other social media group members.

Do not share or discuss personal information, such as upcoming vacations or when you, or other family members, will be away from your home, on social media. Advertising when you are going to be away from your property for an extended period of time is like hanging a "come on in" sign on your door for thieves. Personal information like this should only be shared with a trusted neighbor, friend or family member who can keep an eye on your property while you're away.

Report it

See something suspicious? If it's an emergency or crime in progress, call 9-1-1.



911 SIGNS

Residents are requested to make sure that 911 civic number signs are clear of trees, etc. The sign should be visible by emergency personnel from 100 ft.



Re: Line Clearing and Brush Control

PUC Services Inc. recognizes the value of trees to our environment; however, any tree growing near overhead power lines threatens the integrity of the electrical distribution system. Trees are the cause of costly and annoying power interruptions. To reduce the number of outages and to reduce the associated safety hazards to the public and our utility workers, PUC Services must control the growth of all vegetation in proximity to the power lines.

The purpose of this letter is to inform you of our line clearing program in 2021 in the Prince Lake. Hill Rd areas. The planned work involves the removal of all trees within 3 M, 10ft of the existing Electrical Distribution System corridor. Mature trees that are encroaching within the recommended clearances (as set by the Electrical Safety Authority) or pose a threat to the line will be removed to maintain electrical reliability and prevent electrical contacts by people or wildlife. All branches and brush will be chipped, the wood will be cut up into firewood length and will remain on site for Landowner use. Only the Electrical Right of Way into the intersection of Prince Lake and Hill Rd will be treated with Garlon RTU to prevent regrowth of woody vegetation. The Electrical ROW around the lake will not be treated with Garlon RTU.

The herbicide is a critical tool for PUC Services to maintain our electrical ROW free from regrowth of woody vegetation after it has been cut/brushed out while it will promote greases and wildflowers which increasing Pollinators in the area.

This program will occur in selected areas along our electrical Right of Way where your property may border the power line allowances. If you require further information, please contact the undersigned at (705-542-6219)
