### PRINCE TOWNSHIP DOG LICENCE

Under by-law 2001-03, all residents who own a dog or dogs must register them by purchasing

an annual dog licence. Dog licences are due Jan. 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2019 and will be available at the Munciiplal Office.

To avoid a \$15.00 late fee penalty, all dog licenses must be renewed annually before March 1<sup>st</sup>.

The cost is \$7.50 for spayed or neutered dogs and \$15.00 otherwise.

## **CAO REPORT**



As another year draws to a close, we can reflect on some of the things we accomplished this year. The Festival and Events Pavilion had its Grand Opening in June. It hosted a Vendor's Market throughout the summer, the Tractor Cruz festivities and Alzheimer's Coffee Break.

The surface is being flooded to accommodate a covered skating rink. It should be open by the time you receive this newsletter. Although the rink will be open for public skating, you can rent the ice @ \$25/hour for private events or practice. For rental arrangements, contact the office @ 705-779-2992 Ext. 1.

Further work was done at the Gros Cap Marina Park, completing paths, seeding and installing the canoe/kayak lockers. A time capsule was buried, with the support of TransCanada Trails. It is scheduled to be opened on July 1, 2042.

The rehabilitation of the first kilometers of Prince Lake Road was completed, as well as the repairs to the large culvert on Walls Road.

The Community Hall and kitchen have been given makeovers. New flooring has been installed in both rooms and the hall has been painted, making it a

brighter and modern space. Next year will see the ceiling tiles and track light replaced, the kitchen painted, and the cupboards updated.

Union Gas & Aecon have completed the installation of the gas lines and hook-ups for this year should be completed. Thank you for your patience and consideration shown to the workers over the past months, as they completed this project.

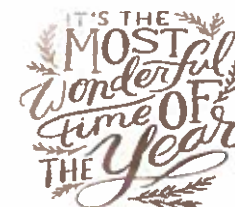
The Community Hall is now being heated with natural gas. The old boiler and tanks have been removed. We plan to replace the propane heater in the Fire Hall in 2019

**Ontario's New CO Alarm Law – The Hawkins-Gignac Act** Carbon Monoxide (CO) is known as 'The Silent Killer' because you can't see it, taste it or smell it. The only way to detect the presence of the deadly gas is to install a carbon monoxide alarm. On October 15, 2014, the Ontario Government formally enacted a new law - **The Hawkins-Gignac Act - making carbon monoxide alarms mandatory in all Ontario homes at risk of CO.** This revision to the Ontario Fire Code, supersedes any existing municipal by-laws.

Now, no matter the age of your home, if you have any oil, propane or gas-burning appliances, furnace or water heater, a wood or gas fireplace, or an attached garage or carport, you must have working carbon monoxide alarms installed near sleeping areas. Ontario's new CO alarm law brings a consistent level of protection to all Ontarians.

### CO Safety Tips to Protect Your Family

- It is law in Ontario to install CSA-approved CO alarms outside sleeping areas.
- CO alarms are required by law to be replaced within the time frame indicated in the manufacturer's instructions and/or on the label on the unit. Some new CO alarms offer sealed lithium batteries that last 10 years from activation.
- For optimal protection, install additional CO alarms on every floor of the home.

- Have a licenced technician inspect your fuel burning appliances annually, (eg. furnace, range, fireplace, water heater) to ensure they are in proper working order and vented correctly.
- For families with older parents or relatives, it is wise to help them inspect their CO alarms.
- CO alarms don't last forever. They need to be replaced every 7-10 years, depending on the brand.
- If your alarm goes off get everyone out of the house, stay out and call 911! Exposure to CO reduces your ability to think clearly, so never delay if your alarm goes off and you sense a problem.

### Keep fire safety in mind as temperatures drop!

There are some simple things people can do to stay fire safe during the colder months:

- Have all fuel-burning appliances inspected annually by a registered fuel contractor. Go to [COSafety.ca](http://COSafety.ca) to find a contractor near you.
- Keep chimneys and intake/exhaust vents for furnaces and heating appliances free of debris, ice and snow accumulations to reduce the risk of carbon monoxide (CO) build-up from inefficient combustion.

- Burn dry, well-seasoned wood in fireplaces and woodstoves to reduce the risk of excessive creosote build-up in chimneys.
- Allow ashes from your fireplace or woodstove to cool before emptying them into a metal container with a tight-fitting lid. Keep the container outside.
- Keep space heaters at least one metre (3 feet) away from anything that can burn, including curtains, upholstery and clothing.
- Replace worn or damaged electrical wires and connections on vehicles and extension cords and use the proper gauge extension cord for vehicle block heaters.
- Consider using approved timers for vehicle block heaters rather than leaving heaters on all night.
- Ensure that vehicles are not left running inside any garage or building.
- Ensure there is a working smoke alarm on every storey and outside all sleeping areas of your home.
- Install CO alarms to alert you to the presence of this deadly gas.

**Prince Twp. Volunteer Fire Department** reminds everyone that the Ontario Fire Code requires smoke alarms to be installed on every storey of your home and outside all sleeping areas. Carbon monoxide alarms are required outside all sleeping areas if the home has a fuel-burning appliance, a fireplace or an attached garage. ## KEEP YOUR FAMILY SAFE FROM CARBON MONOXIDE

**You can't see it or smell it, but carbon monoxide (CO) is a poisonous gas that can be deadly.**

Fuel-burning equipment that is malfunctioning or poorly vented can cause a dangerous build-up of CO in your home. Take these steps to keep your loved ones safe:

- Get your furnace, water heater and all other fuel-burning equipment inspected and maintained **every year** by a Technical Standards and Safety Authority (TSSA) registered heating contractor.
- Install CO alarms on every level of your home, especially near sleeping areas.
- Check to ensure outside exhaust vents, flues and chimneys are clear of leaves, nests and other debris.

Please note that CO alarms detect CO only. To detect a natural gas leak, you need a natural gas alarm or combination CO/natural gas alarm.

It has been an absolute pleasure working with the township and we are so proud to be serving the community for years to come.

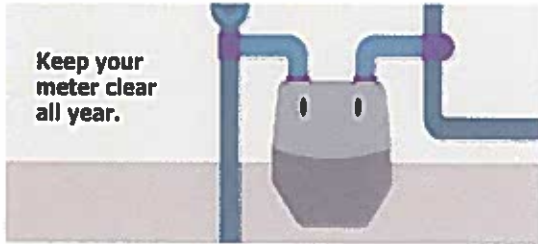

## GAS METER SAFETY

### Gas Meter Safety



It's important to keep your natural gas meter and exhaust vents free of ice and snow in winter, and clear of storage boxes, garden tools and vegetation in summer. This helps ensure that gas-fired equipment functions safely and efficiently, and allows Union Gas easy access for accurate meter readings or emergency response.

Indoor heating equipment – your furnace, water heater and thermostat – needs to be accessible too. Please ensure that storage boxes and household supplies are kept well away from indoor appliances so Union Gas or your heating contractor can get at them for emergency service or repairs.

Be sure your pets are secured and not blocking access to your gas meter or equipment during meter reading and service calls. A visiting Union Gas representative can surprise even the friendliest dog and lead to aggressive behavior and bites



## EMERGENCY PLANNING FOR EXTREME COLD WEATHER

### Prepare Your Home and Car for Winter

#### *At Home:*

- Have alternate means of heating with sufficient fuel, such as a wood or propane furnace, or a kerosene heater. Ensure alternative source of heat is approved for indoor use
- Generator with several days' worth of fuel (Caution: generators produce toxic gases such as carbon monoxide. These should only be used outdoors where fumes may be vented safely.)
- Electric space heaters with automatic shut-off and non-glowing elements (to reduce the risk of fire)
- Blankets

#### *In the Car:*

- Travel with a mobile phone
- Blankets and other warm clothing (gloves, toques, jacket) – never rely on a car for heat since it may break down
- First aid kit
- Signaling device, such as road flares
- Booster cables
- Toolkit
- Bag of sand (to pour on ice or snow for added traction)
- Tow rope

- Collapsible shovel
- Flash light and spare batteries

#### Candles and matches

- - Brightly colored clothes
  - Container of water and high energy bars
- Windshield scraper

Ontario 511 is an Ontario Ministry of Transportation telephone service that provides the public with voice-activated, hands-free information on provincial highways:

- Road closures
- Winter road conditions
- Construction projects

## How to access Ontario 511

Just dial 511. Call to check the roads before setting out on a trip.

If calling 511 while driving, observe Ontario's ban on cell phone use while driving. Pull over safely to the road shoulder before calling or use hands-free, Bluetooth technology.

- Zero-out to an agent from Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- Access to 511 from other jurisdictions, such as 511 Quebec, 511 NY
- For callers outside of province: 1-866-929-4257

## Ontario 511 Technology

The 511 telephone service uses voice recognition and text-to-speech technologies to

give road information in audio format. Since information is pulled from a variety of

databases, you will hear different voice recordings on 511.

## Tips for using the Ontario 511 website

- Click on the topics listed in the left hand legend to access the text information or click on the map to activate the interactive map.
- Use the Google map's + or - to zoom in or out, or click and drag 'hand' to move across the province.
- Select information layers by clicking on the boxes in the map's legend. The topics selected will appear as symbols or colours on the map. The symbols and colours are explained in the legend below the map.
- Clicking on a symbol/condition on the map will give a pop-up with detailed information.

## MTO terminology and colours for describing road conditions explained

MTO is using a new national terminology and colour scheme on its online interactive map and 511 phone line to describe winter road conditions. Canadian road authorities have developed a common winter road condition terminology and colour scheme to provide consistency for the travelling public wherever they use 511 in Canada.

## Are You Feeding Wildlife?

*Issues of residents feeding wildlife have been reported to the Municipal Office. We do take this very seriously.*

### You may be doing more harm than good.

People who feed wildlife usually do so with the best intentions. However, feeding wild animals almost always results in negative consequences for both humans and wildlife involved.

### What are the consequences of feeding wildlife?

#### Threats to wildlife

- Animals can become dependent on artificial food sources.
- Animals can lose their natural fear of humans and pets, becoming more prone to conflict.
- Artificial feed is not healthy for wildlife.
- Wildlife can congregate in unnaturally high densities at feeders. This spreads parasites and disease (such as Chronic Wasting Disease, bovine tuberculosis,

and brain worm) and can cause destruction of natural habitat.

- Feeding animals near roads increases their risk of being hit by vehicles.

#### Threats to people

- Feeding wildlife may attract "unwanted" animals to your property.
- Animals will learn to associate humans with food, and can become a problem to neighbours.
- Habituated animals can become aggressive.
- Feeding animals near roads increases the risk of motor vehicle accidents, resulting in property damage, injury or death.

#### Do

- ✓ Appreciate wildlife from a distance.
- ✓ Keep household waste, compost and pet food out-of-reach from wild animals.
- ✓ Attract wildlife to your property by improving natural habitat.
- ✓ Work together in your neighbourhood to help keep wild animals wild.

#### Don't

- ✗ Do not put out food to attract wildlife.
- ✗ Do not try to approach or touch wild animals.
- ✗ Do not feed pets outdoors or allow

pets to roam free.

✗ Do not put garbage out until the morning of collection.

## Prince Township

### Recycling Cart Collection System

The recycling cart does not have to be placed out on every pick-up day. It should not be put out unless it is at least half full.

Carts must be placed at least 1 metre (3 feet) in front of or beside fences/retaining walls, vehicles or other carts. They must be free from all obstructions to allow for the automated pick-up.

Carts must be out by 7:30 a.m. on your pick-up day. The top of the cart lid indicates which way the cart should face. They must face the proper way or they will be rejected. (Cart handle and wheels need to face the residence.)

Please make sure the lids are completely closed.

Please remove caps/lids and rinse food contents before recycling containers. All food trays, strawberry containers, etc. are not accepted and should be placed in your garbage. Large quantities of cardboard boxes should be broken down to 2' x 2' x 1' bundles (taped or tied with string) and placed beside the collection cart.

**Note:** Florescent lights are to be disposed of at the Household Hazardous Waste Depot.

#### Blue Lid

- Steel (tin) food cans
- Aluminium cans
- No. 1 plastic bottles (i.e. pop bottles)
- No. 2 plastic bottles (i.e. shampoo bottles)
- Glass bottles and jars

#### Grey Lid

- Newspapers and flyers
- Magazines
- Phone books
- Boxboard/small boxes (i.e. cereal boxes)
- Paper egg cartons
- Toilet/towel paper rolls
- Clean milk cartons
- Clean pizza boxes
- All other paper products (i.e. mail, computer paper)
