### **HOLIDAY GARBAGE**

As a result of the Monday February 17<sup>th</sup> Family Day Holiday, garbage pick up will be on Thursday February 20<sup>th</sup> instead of the usual Wednesday.

### **RECYCLING CART COLLECTION**

Please have your cart out by 7:30 a.m. Your recycling will be picked up every two weeks. **Feb. 6, 21** (one day late because of the Family Day Holiday), **Mar. 5**

### **BAG TAG LOCATIONS**

Please remember to use bag tags when you have more than two bags of refuse to be collected. Each bag tag is \$2. Tags can be purchased at Airways General Store or the Municipal Office.

### **POSTAL DELIVERY / 911 SIGNS**

Property owners are reminded to keep mail boxes (including green boxes) clear of snow and other obstacles in order to receive uninterrupted mail should be kept clear of snow so that they are visible by emergency vehicles. The sign should be visible by emergency personnel from 100ft.

### **SNOW REMOVAL REMINDER**



Pushing snow across roads and streets is not only a safety hazard; it is also against the law. The Ontario Traffic Act states:  
No person shall deposit snow or ice on a roadway without permission in writing to do so from the Ministry or the road authority responsible for the maintenance of the road. R.S.O. 1990, c. H.8, s. 181

**Prince Twp. By-law 2019-38 also prohibits this action.**

### **GARBAGE AND RECYCLING BINS**

Garbage and recycling bins are to be placed inside the end of your driveway and **NOT** on the edge of the road. In the winter month, it is safer to put them out in the morning, rather than risk them being hit by the snowplough. The cost of replacing bins that are damaged is the responsibility of the property owners.

Vulnerable populations may include the following: Elderly, physically or developmentally challenged, sick, single parents, racial and ethnic minorities, new comers & children. In the event of an extended power disruption or disruption to 911 service, volunteers will attend the homes of vulnerable citizens to ensure their safety. You **must** fill out a registration form to be put on the vulnerable list. ## ATTENTION DOG OWNERS

Under by-law 2001-03, all residents who own a dog or dogs must register them by purchasing an annual dog licence. Dog licences are due Jan. 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2020 and will be available at the Municipal Office.

To avoid a \$15.00 late fee penalty, all dog licenses must be renewed annually before **March 1<sup>st</sup>, 2020**. **Remember to bring in conformation of last rabies shot date to purchase a tag.**

The cost is \$7.50 for spayed or neutered dogs and \$15.00 otherwise.

If you no longer have your dog, please contact the office.

## CAO/TREASURER REPORT

Happy Valentine's Day



As you are all aware, the entire township experienced a power outage which began on New Year's Eve. For those at Prince Lake, the outage lasted approximately 60 hours. This event gave our Community Emergency Management Coordinator (CEMC), the Mayor, council, staff, and fire department an opportunity to test our emergency management plan. During the outage, there was communication between the members of the Emergency Management Control Group. The phone lines at the office and the weather forecasts were being monitored. We also checked on anyone on the vulnerable persons list.

As the temperatures were between 3 degrees and -2 degrees during the outage, and there was a warming centre at the Water Tower Inn, and many residents have wood stoves or family and friends in the city, there was a decision not to open a warming centre at the hall. The calls that were received by the mayor, council and at the office only questioned if we knew when the power might be restored. There were no distress calls.

Having said that, this is a reminder that if you or a loved one is vulnerable, they should register at the office. Also, everyone should have their own emergency plan. There have been lists

provided in previous newsletters, as to what your plan should include and what supplies and items one should have on hand, including a battery-operated radio. Watch for future newsletters that will be providing this information again.

This event will also prove valuable for our team for future training and lessons learned.

February 17<sup>th</sup> marks the 13<sup>th</sup> annual Family Day! Enjoy time with your families. The office is closed that day! ☺ Please remember, garbage and recycling will be delayed by one day.

## Safety reminder to residents Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Alarms

Property owners, ensure you have working smoke alarms on each storey of their home and outside every sleeping area.

Fire moves so fast that you may have less than 60 seconds to safely escape a fire, so early warning is crucial to survival. Only working smoke alarms give you that early warning. Developing and practicing a home escape plan is just as important.

### Simple smoke and carbon monoxide alarm tips:

- Install smoke alarms on every storey and outside all sleeping areas of your home. For added protection, install a smoke alarm in every bedroom according to manufacturer's recommendations. Larger homes may require additional smoke alarms;
- Install carbon monoxide alarms outside all sleeping areas if your home has a fuel-burning appliance, fireplace or attached garage. For added protection, install a carbon monoxide alarm on every storey of your home according to manufacturer's

recommendations;

- Test smoke and carbon monoxide alarms monthly by pressing the test button. Change the batteries every year; and,
- Smoke and carbon monoxide alarms wear out over time. Replace alarms according to manufacturer's recommendations.

### Simple steps for home fire escape planning include:

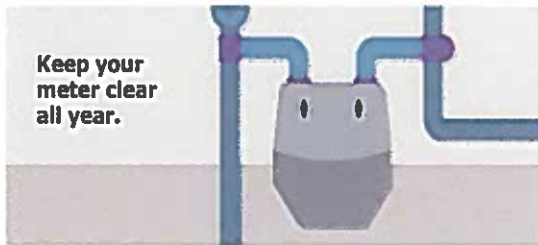
- Everyone should know two ways out of each room, if possible;
- All exits must be unobstructed and easy to use;
- If someone in your home has a disability, develop a home fire escape plan with your household that takes into account their unique needs. Determine who will be responsible for helping young children, older adults and anyone who needs assistance to escape;
- Choose a meeting place outside, such as a tree or a lamp post, where everyone can be accounted for;
- Call the fire department from outside the home, from a cell phone or a neighbour's home;
- Practice your home fire escape plan; and,
- Once out, stay out. Never re-enter a burning building.

## GAS METER SAFETY

### Gas Meter Safety



It's important to **keep your natural gas meter and exhaust vents free of ice and snow** in winter, and clear of storage boxes, garden tools and vegetation in summer. This helps ensure that gas-fired equipment functions safely and efficiently, and allows Union Gas easy access for accurate meter readings or emergency response.

Indoor heating equipment – your furnace, water heater and thermostat – needs to be accessible too. Please ensure that storage boxes and household supplies are kept well away from indoor appliances so Union Gas or your heating contractor can get at them for emergency service or repairs.

Be sure your pets are secured and not blocking access to your gas meter or equipment during meter reading and service calls. A visiting Union Gas representative can surprise even the friendliest dog and lead to aggressive behavior and bites.



## PRINCE TOWNSHIP RECYCLING CART COLLECTION

The recycling cart does not have to be placed out on every pick-up. It should not be put out unless it is at least half full.

Carts must be out by 7:30 a.m. on your pick-up day.

Please make sure the lids are completely closed.

Please remove caps/lids and rinse food contents before recycling containers. All food trays, strawberry containers, etc. are not accepted and should be placed in your garbage. Large quantities of cardboard boxes should be broken down to 2' x 2' x 1' bundles (taped or tied with string) and placed beside the collection cart.

**Note:** Florescent lights are to be disposed of at the **Household Hazardous Waste Depot**.

## Dental care for low-income seniors

Learn how to access free, routine dental care for eligible seniors 65 years or older, through the Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program. The program is designed to support low-income seniors.

### About the program

The new Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program is a government-funded dental care program. It provides free, routine dental services for low-income seniors who are **65 years of age or older**.

### Coverage includes:

- check-ups, including scaling, fluoride and polishing
- repairing broken teeth and cavities
- x-rays
- removing teeth or abnormal tissue (oral surgery)
- anesthesia
- treating infection and pain (endodontic services)
- treating gum conditions and diseases (periodontal services)

### Dentures

Dental prosthetics (prosthodontic services), including dentures, will be partially covered. Please speak to your local public health unit for more information.

### Coverage period

Once you are enrolled in the program, your coverage period is for up to one year.

Your coverage will end on July 31st every year, no matter when you enroll. Learn more about renewing your yearly coverage.

### Eligibility

You can apply for the program if you:

- are 65 years of age or older
- are a resident of Ontario
- meet the income requirements:
  - o an annual net income of \$19,300 or less for a single senior
  - o a combined annual net income of \$32,300 or less for a couple
- have no other form of dental benefits, including private insurance or dental coverage under another government program such as Ontario Works, Ontario Disability Support Program or Non-Insured Health Benefits

We will verify your income using your Social Insurance Number (SIN), that you will provide when you apply to the program. We will use your SIN to verify your annual new income from your tax return. Learn how you can apply if you don't have a SIN.

### How to apply:

You can apply to the program online or by mail.

If you and your spouse or common-law partner are applying to the program, you must submit two separate applications.

Before you begin the online application, you need:

- your date of birth
- a valid Ontario address
- your Social Insurance Number (SIN) or Temporary Taxation Number (TTN)
- to have filed your taxes last year

If you do not have a SIN or did not file taxes in the previous year, please complete the Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program application through guarantor form.

### Apply online

To apply online:

1. Complete the online application.
2. Print and fill out the consent form.
3. Mail the completed consent form within 30 days to:

2. Fill out and complete the application form.

If you don't have a SIN or did not file a tax return

If you don't have a SIN or didn't file your taxes last year, a guarantor must help you apply by mail.

A guarantor is someone who can confirm the identity, age and residency of the individual or couple applying to the program. The guarantor must be:

a Canadian citizen  at least 18 years of age

If more than one person in your household is applying, you only need one guarantor per household.

#### List of eligible guarantors

A guarantor must be a practicing member, in good standing with a provincial regulatory body, serving as a:

doctor (physician or surgeon)  nurse  dentist or dental hygienist  optometrist  pharmacist  psychologist  chiropractor  midwife  veterinarian  lawyer  professional accountant  professional engineer  social worker or social service worker  teacher, vice-principal or principal in a primary or secondary school  dietitian  judge or Justice of the Peace  municipal, provincial or First Nations police officer or constable  Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) officer or constable

mayor  member of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario  minister of religion authorized under provincial law to perform marriages  municipal clerk or treasurer who is a member of the Association of Municipal Managers or Clerks and Treasurers of Ontario  notary public  professor in a university, a senior administrator in a community college  signing officer of a bank

#### After you apply

Once you have completed and submitted your application form, you will be contacted by phone and/or mail if there are any issues with your application or if your application is incomplete.

If your application is approved, you will receive a welcome package and dental card in the mail that will expire on July 31st.

The welcome package will tell you:

how to access services  where to book an appointment  how to book an appointment  what you need to bring to each appointment

You must present your card to your dental provider at each visit to receive services under the program.

#### Find a participating dentist

For information about where to access services and what services are available near you, please contact your local public health unit.

If you are accepted into the program, you can access dental services through:

Public Health Units  partner Community Health Centres  partner Aboriginal Health Access Centres

Access to the full range of dental services will vary across the province. The program will continue to expand in the coming year.

#### Renew your yearly coverage

Every year, eligibility will be automatically verified for most clients to confirm enrolment for the next benefit period.

You will be notified by mail if you are eligible to keep participating in the

program, or about how to re-apply to the program, if required.

You must reapply if:

you applied using a guarantor  you do not file taxes for the most recent tax years that your eligibility is being determined

#### Change your account information

If you are enrolled in the program and would like to make changes to your account, you must complete and submit a change of information form.
