BURNING PERMITS

Anyone wishing to burn must drop by the Municipal Office during regular hours to pick up your burning permit.
Permit fees will be as follows:
\$10.00 - yearly
\$2.00 - two weeks
\$20.00 - day burning (special permit that has to be authorized by the Fire Chief)
No day burning still applies.
Please phone the Fire Dept., as per your permit, prior to any burning, to determine if there are any fire restrictions.

Remember burning without a permit, will result in a fine.

The paving on Prince Lake Road should be starting soon. Watch for traffic delays and be patient. The culvert replacement on Walls Road will also be happening this summer. Watch for detours. Aecon is working on the installation of the natural gas lines, throughout the township. Be courteous of the workers and pass the areas where they are working with caution.

I hope you enjoyed the grand opening of the Prince Township Festival and Events Pavilion on June 9th. The event was very successful, the weather co-operated, and a good time was had by all. Thank you to all those who donated their time, money and/or prizes.

This summer, the municipality has hired 2 road crew students, the library, museum and parent/child resource centre have each hired 1 student. This is possible through the Canada Summer Jobs sponsorship. Also, through the generous grant from the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund, we were successful in hiring an intern for 1 year. We have welcomed Chelsey

to the office. In the fall, she will be spending some of her hours in the Library, allowing some extra open hours for all the bookworms out there.

The final tax bill for 2018 will be mailed around the 15th of July. There are two installments on this bill, August 15 and October 15. Interest is charged monthly on overdue balances, at a rate of 1.25%. With the education rate included, the total tax rate for 2018 is 0.01008313.

Tips to Reduce Problem Bears

People are reminded to take the necessary steps to help avoid attracting bears into populated areas.

Garbage, outdoor grills and bird feed commonly attract black bears. Minimize your chances of attracting bears by:

- Putting garbage out only on the morning of collection.
- Storing garbage in waste containers with tight-fitting lids.
- Frequently wash garbage cans, recycling containers and lids with a strong disinfectant.
- Remove grease/food residue from BBQ grills including the grease cup, after each use.
- Put away bird feeders and offer natural alternatives like flowers, nesting boxes and fresh water.

Often a bear is just passing through, and if it does not find a food source it will simply move on.

LYME DISEASE IN ONTARIO

If you regularly go camping or hiking, you have likely heard of Lyme disease. This bacterial infection spreads primarily through the often-painless bites of infected blacklegged ticks.

When contracted, Lyme disease can trigger a series of health issues in the long term including heart palpitations, paralysis and neurological disorders. In rare cases, it can even lead to death.

Incidences of Lyme disease are more common in the summer, when blacklegged ticks are active in Canada's forests. Since they are tiny and their bites are painless, Lyme disease sufferers may not even know that they have it - that is what makes it so dangerous. What is worse? Lyme disease is on the rise in Canada. The Public Health Agency of Canada reported a 50% increase in Lyme disease incidences in 2017; they also expect that number to rise in 2018.

What do you need to know to protect you and your loved ones from Lyme disease? Prevention is the name of the game for a disease that is so easy to overlook. Here are some easy ways to safeguard your home and family this summer:

- **Keep your lawn tidy!** Though they prefer to live in warm, damp forests, blacklegged ticks may seek refuge in your yard if it is unkempt. Regularly mow your lawn and remove any dying plant material or fallen leaves to ward off the bugs!
- **Get your pets treated for ticks!** Lyme disease affects dogs too, and since symptoms may not be obvious to an unwary pet-owner, prevention is key. A variety of tick-repellants are available at your local pet store, and your local veterinarian may provide Lyme disease vaccinations as well.
- **Do a daily full body check to find unwanted ticks:** If you find one attached to your skin, gently pull it out with tweezers. Do the same for your kids! If you cannot remember to do a check every day? Make a habit to check for ticks before your shower every day this will help you remember.
- **Wear bug spray with DEET!** DEET is a chemical found in the most effective bug sprays. A higher concentration will not repel bugs better, but it does guarantee that the spray will keep bugs away for longer.
- **Avoid walking in forested areas when possible!** The farther you are from trees and plant life, the less likely it is that you will come into contact with ticks.
- **Dress appropriately, when you venture into conservation areas or wooded regions!** Wearing thin, long-sleeved shirts and pants reduces your exposure to ticks, and choosing lighter colours to make it easier to spot the bugs. Bonus points if you tuck in your shirt and pull your socks over your pant legs!

- Wash and dry your clothes with high heat! The temperature will kill any ticks that latched onto them.

Despite these precautions, there is still a chance that you or someone you love could contract Lyme disease. Treatment is quick and simple - a short course of antibiotics from your doctor will cure the sufferer. However, the signs are easy to miss, and they only get worse with time. Do not let a case of Lyme disease develop - learn how to recognize the symptoms so you can seek treatment quickly!



Are You Prepared?

Emergencies can strike anywhere, at any time. That's why everyone in Ontario is encouraged to be prepared—by having a plan, assembling a survival kit, and by staying informed.

Build an Emergency Survival Kit

Your emergency survival kit should have everything you and your family would need to be safe and take care of yourselves for at least three days immediately following an emergency.

The following list is broken down into the essentials, items you may need to meet your family's unique needs, and items to have ready in case you must leave your home.

WHAT TO PUT IN YOUR SURVIVAL KIT

Essentials

- Food (non-perishable and easy-to-prepare items, enough for 3 days) and a manual can opener
- Bottled water (4 litres per person for each day)
- Medication(s)
- Flashlight
- Radio (crank or battery-run)
- Extra batteries
- First-aid kit
- Candles and matches/lighter
- Hand sanitizer or moist towelettes
- Important papers (identification, contact lists, copies of prescriptions, etc.)
- Extra car keys and cash
- Whistle (to attract attention, if needed)
- Zip-lock bag (to keep things dry)
- Garbage bags

Special Considerations

- Items for babies and small children—diapers, formula, bottles, baby food, comfort items
- Prescription medication
- Medical supplies and equipment
- Pet food and supplies
- Any other items specific to your family's needs

Extra Supplies for Evacuation

- Clothes, shoes
- Sleeping bags or blankets
- Personal items (soap, toothpaste, shampoo, comb, other toiletries)
- Playing cards, travel games, other activities for children

Be Informed

There are two main ways that you can be informed about emergencies: sign up for Ontario's emergency alerts, and learn more about the hazards you can ace and how you can be prepared for them.

During an emergency, you should stay tuned to local news channels. Be sure to have a portable, battery-operated or crank radio in your survival kit in case of power outages.

Emergency Alerts

Ontario's three types of alerts—[Red Alerts](#), [Emergency Information Advisories](#) and [Tornado](#)

[Warnings](#)—quickly deliver information on threats or emergencies that have occurred via email, text message, RSS feed, and other channels. They usually include information on how to keep you and your family safe.





Tips for keeping your property and neighborhood safe

Lock it

Lock your garage, your vehicles and your home - even when you are home. It may sound obvious, but many criminals will check to see if doors are unlocked, giving them an easy opportunity to strike. Also, whether you have a security system or a dog, put up signs warning people about both. If everything is locked up and criminals are faced with the prospect of additional deterrents, most will move on.

Secure it

Install additional security locks on exterior doors and windows and don't forget about surveillance! When possible, install devices that permit sight to the other side, such as chain link fences, and keep shrubs and bushes trimmed below ground level windows and trees pruned above eye level to eliminate areas of potential concealment. Consider installing a security system as an additional deterrent.

Light it

Turn on your lights! Use timers on your lights when you're away from your home or business so they appear occupied. At night, use outdoor lighting to enhance illumination in dark areas around your property where an intruder might hide, such as stairwells, alleys and hallways. Install motion lights and/or cameras at all entrances and turn your porch lights on at night.

Hide it

Install and use blinds and curtains to prevent people from seeing inside your home, especially at night. Protect yourself, your belongings and your privacy with good quality window coverings. Consider frosted treatments on garage windows, which will still allow in natural light, but prevent people from seeing inside your garage. And don't "hide" spare keys under a doormat or in a planter; keep them with a trusted neighbor or nearby business.

Remove it

Never leave valuables in your vehicle, especially a wallet or purse. Take any electronics, such as cell phones, tablets and laptops inside with you, including your remote garage door opener. In many cases, criminals will enter a vehicle for the sole purpose of stealing your garage door opener. In hopes of gaining access to your garage and, subsequently, your home. Also, be cautious about placing boxes from big ticket items, such as a new television, out for recycling as this can be an invitation to thieves who now know exactly what's in your home.

Share it

Introduce yourself to your neighbor's, as neighbor's who know each other watch out for one another. Get to know other people who live on your street. Consider setting up (or joining!) a page on social media for your subdivision as a way to communicate and share information with one another. But keep in mind you need to be cautious about what you share on social media sites - even if it's considered a friendly or

helpful group. Divulging too much personal information can potentially put you and your property at risk, as there is no way to know or control the intentions of other social media group members.

Do not share or discuss personal information, such as upcoming vacations or when you, or other family members, will be away from your home, on social media. Advertising when you are going to be away from your property for an extended period of time is like hanging a "come on in" sign on your door for thieves. Personal information like this should only be shared with a trusted neighbor, friend or family member who can keep an eye on your property while you're away.
