CAO REPORT

Between November 1 and March 31, you do not need burning permits for bonfires and cook fires.

PART 5 – OPEN AIR BURNING – NOVEMBER 1 TO MARCH 31

- 5.1 No permits are required for cooking fires or bon fires up to 1 metre in diameter and 1 metre in height.
- 5.2 Permits will be required for brush piles larger than 1 metre in height and 1 metre in diameter and shall not exceed 2 metres in height and 4 metres in diameter.
- (a) These special permits will only be issued in this time frame

and not during the regular burn season from May 1st to Oct 31st.

- (b) All normal precautions need to be adhered to. Heavy equipment, water, hand tools and fire suppression equipment must be on site and readily accessible.
- (c) A site inspection by the Fire Department is required before a permit can be issued to ensure proper setbacks.

- 5.3 All fires must be attended at all times. Unattended fires will be in violation of the bylaw.
- 5.4 Burning can take place during the day or night but must take into consideration wind speed, wind direction, fog conditions, ground moisture and nuisance to neighbours and roadways.
- 5.5 Nuisance burning that impacts a neighbour or road as outlined in the Open-Air Burning By-Law 2012-11 will be considered in violation of the by law.
- 5.6 Fires that impact on neighbouring properties or roadways must be extinguished immediately or be in violation of the by law.
- 5.7 Failure to comply with this by law will subject the homeowner to the fine schedule as laid out in the current open air burning by law 2012-11.

AECON has put in all the gas lines for Union Gas and people are getting hooked up now. A generous donation was made by Union Gas to the fire hall for the purchase of a Carbon Monoxide gas monitor for use in the emergency vehicles.

Each year Prince Township sponsors an award at Sault College. This award goes to a student from Prince attending the College. However, students MUST apply for this award, through the College by November 16, 2018. If you or anyone you know is a student at Sault College, make sure the application goes into the

Scholarship, Bursary and Awards program (online) as soon as possible.

As well, the Prince Township Women's Institute, along with Prince Township sponsor an award at Algoma University. Deadline for the application for Students for this award is October 31, 2018. This is very short notice, but hopefully, as students at the university, you are aware of the deadline.

Congratulations to our own Leslie Cassidy-Amadio who was re-elected to the Huron Superior Roman Catholic School Board. Your existing council enjoyed a stress-free acclamation this election.

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Fire Department

As you know, the winter season is knocking at our door. Heaters are turned on and wood stoves are cranked up.

This is just a friendly reminder from your local Fire Department.

- Test your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors and remember to replace the batteries. It could be a life-saver!
- Make sure your furnace or wood stove is in proper working order and check that the chimney is clear of any obstructions.
- Make a fire escape plan and be sure to practice, practice and practice!

BURNING REMINDER

Between November 1 and March 31 you do not need burning permits for bonfires and cook fires. Below is Sections 5 & 6, extracted from By-Law 2013-04 with specific rules that apply: **PART 5 – OPEN AIR BURNING – NOVEMBER 1 TO MARCH 31**

- 5.1 No permits are required for cooking fires or bon fires up to 1 metre in diameter and 1 metre in height.
- 5.2 Permits will be required for brush piles larger than 1 metre in height and 1 metre in diameter and shall not exceed 2 metres in height and 4 metres in diameter.

- (a) These special permits will only be issued in this time frame and not during the regular burn season from May 1st to Oct 31st.
- (b) All normal precautions need to be adhered to. Heavy equipment, water, hand tools and fire suppression equipment must be on site and readily accessible.
- (c) A site inspection by the Fire Department is required before a permit can be issued to ensure proper setbacks.


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- 5.4 Burning can take place during the day or night but must take into consideration wind speed, wind direction, fog conditions, ground moisture and nuisance to neighbours and roadways.
- 5.5 Nuisance burning that impacts a neighbour or road as outlined in the Open Air Burning By Law 2012-11 will be considered in violation of the by law.
- 5.6 Fires that impact on neighbouring properties or roadways must be extinguished immediately or be in violation of the by law.
- 5.7 Failure to comply with this by law will subject the homeowner to the fine schedule as laid out in the current open air burning by law 2012-11.

PART 6 – BURNING OF LEAVES

- 6.1 The burning of leaves is expressly forbidden throughout the year, with the exception of the months of May and October.
- 6.2 All other provisions of this by-law, including size and time restrictions, shall apply when burning leaves under section 5.

GAS METER SAFETY

Gas Meter Safety



It's important to keep your natural gas meter and exhaust vents free of ice and snow in winter, and clear of storage boxes, garden tools and vegetation in summer. This helps ensure that gas-fired equipment functions safely and efficiently, and allows Union Gas easy access for accurate meter readings or emergency response.

Indoor heating equipment – your furnace, water heater and thermostat – needs to be accessible too. Please ensure that storage boxes and household supplies are kept well away from indoor appliances so Union Gas or your heating contractor can get at them for emergency service or repairs.

Be sure your pets are secured and not blocking access to your gas meter or equipment during meter reading and service calls. A visiting Union Gas representative can surprise even the friendliest dog and lead to aggressive behavior and bites.
